One thing he did that I knew would be fun was a pair of stages on the same set, one with the targets at SASS minimum recommended distances, and one at SASS maximum recommended distances. You may have noticed we're into variety around here, although not always to that degree. Average scores between the two stages were a whopping 30 seconds apart, although Crumville Kid got it down to less than 5 seconds, and Ozark Lawdog's delta was less than 8 seconds.

For Ozark, Bad Bascomb, and Goode Bascomb, the match was a final tune-up before they headed to New Mexico for End of Trail. They made the club proud down at Founder's Ranch, but not before they all finished in the top 5 at our June match. Bad Bascomb won the match going away, with Ozark Lawdog, Venomous Doc, Crumville Kid, and Goode Bascomb rounding out the top one-third.

Desert Willow and I just returned home from Joseph, OR, a beautiful spot in the mountains in the northeast corner of the state. Also along in the two-RV caravan were two daughters, one son-in-law, and four grandchildren. MISSING (TOGGLE) LINK: THE WINCHESTER MODEL 1868

Do you know your Winchesters? I'd venture to say most of us who play this game think we have a pretty good handle on the evolution of the Winchester lever action. I used to think I was up to speed until I read an article in the American Rifleman a few years back. The article, entitled "Winchester's 'Centennial' Rifle," was about the Winchester Model 1876, and it included some surprising information.

We've all seen the Winchester "line-up," in pictures and in museums. It starts, of course, with the Henry rifle of 1860. Although the Henry didn't have Oliver Winchester's name on it, it was manufactured by his company, New Haven Arms, and it takes its rightful place in line as "the first Winchester." Next is the Model 1866. It is the first firearm to bear the Winchester name, and like the Henry, it takes a rim fire 44 caliber cartridge. Up to this point in my life I had believed that the Model 1873 came next (wrong), that with the exception of a handful of Henrys it was the first iron frame Winchester (wrong), and that it was the first center fire Winchester (also wrong). You may be a little confused at this point, but I bet you know one thing for sure: The next Winchester was the Model 1876 (right!), which was basically an oversized Model 1873 (wrong).

The American Rifleman article was written by a gentleman name Herbert G. Houze, the former curator of the Winchester Firearms Collection at the Buffalo Bill Historic Center in Cody, Wyoming, and a recognized Winchester expert. He got my attention in the second paragraph when he wrote, "Though folklore has insisted that the Model 1876 was simply a larger scale version of the smaller frame Model 1873, those stories are myths. The origins of the Model 1876's design actually pre-date its chronological predecessor by some eight years."

"In the immediate post-Civil War period, Oliver F. Winchester embarked on an ambitious program to develop new repeating rifles for foreign markets. Utilizing iron frames with detachable sideplates, these rifles were first produced for the Swiss Confederation in 1866. *continued on page*

then for other governments in 1867 and 1868. Chambered for a variety of .45- and .50-cal. Center-fire cartridges, all of these models incorporated large receivers fitted with elongated sideplates. Though they achieved some commercial success, in 1869 the program was temporarily set aside due to the pressures being put on the Winchester factory by its Turkish contracts.

"Following the U.S. Breech-Loading Rifle Trials of 1872, Oliver F. Winchester revived the project at the instigation of the French Government (through the agency of Francois de Suzanne). During 1873 and 1874, a series of full-stock carbines and muskets were made for de Suzanne using receivers based upon the Model 1868 iron frame Winchester rifle." The article goes on to say how this work led to the development of the Model 76.

My library includes numerous firearm reference books, including "The Rifle in America," and "The Gun and its Development." Neither of those tomes mentions the Model 1868 and its role in the development of the large frame, center fire rifle that would become the well-known Model 1876. In fact, "The Rifle in America" perpetuates that myth that so annoys Mr. Houze, flatly stating, "Frankly, the 76 was merely an enlargement of the Model 1873..."

The Winchester Model 1868 has very nearly slipped under the radar of firearms history. But I now know there are a few of them out there, and one day I'm going to have a look at one. Maybe I'd better ring up the Autrey Museum in L.A. and see if they have one laying around.
