I'm even sentimental about when I first started in Cowboy Action Shooting. It will be twenty years ago next September, and boy, has this game ever changed. I shot my first match at 5 Dogs Creek, and the range was nothing like it is today. This was when Cowboy Action Shooting was just ramping up for the exponential growth that would continue unabated for about ten years. Most of what you see today at 5 Dogs was added during that time period.

As for the game itself, wow. Pistol targets were four-inch squares welded to a narrow base, sitting on pedestals about four feet tall. You had to knock the target off the pedestal for a hit. The shotgun targets were the same but bigger, and sitting on the ground. They had to be knocked over. I don't remember if make-ups were allowed. Rifle targets were in between (in size 10 - 12 inches), at about 25-30 yards, and stationary. Things have changed just a tad!

On the SASS Wire there is an interesting thread that should be looked at by everyone who is interested in the history and evolution of CAS. Deuce Stevens, a top shooter and also an intelligent and thoughtful guy, posted a link to the scores from Range War 2002. For the most part, Deuce prefers things as they are today, but there is lots of respectful (mostly) disagreement in the thread. The winner of the match averaged 36 seconds per stage. Bullet Pulling Made Easy

Most of us reload. Or, more accurately, most couples shoot handloads. You pretty much have to, assuming you can find powder, primers, and bullets, and those shortages seem to be easing a little bit.

I don't load shotgun shells, but since '97 I've been making various pistol calibers on a Dillon Square Deal B. It works great, but only for handgun cartridges. Even the .30 carbine round, which looks like a pistol cartridge to me, is too long overall,

What with Military Bolt Action long range, The Professionals, and the Great Train Robbery, we have a need for lead bullet rifle rounds at our annual. I have six such rifles—two Russian Mosin-Nagants, a British Enfield, a French Berthier, an Austrian M 95, and a German Mauser, all of which kick like Missouri mules with MILSURP ammo. A while back I decided to get a single stage press and try making my own lead-bullet cartridges. Removing the FMJ bullets from some Russian surplus ammo took three solid whacks on the garage floor in my kinetic bullet puller. Then I remembered a friend had given me a press-mounted bullet puller.

It screws into the press like a die. After the usual trial and error depth adjustments, you put a cartridge in the shell holder, raise the ram, tighten the collet around the bullet, and lower the ram, pulling the bullet. Then you dump and weight the powder, put some of it back in the case (how much is up to you), and seat a lead bullet. Yes, the primers are corrosive, but this isn't as big a deal as some people make out. Relax. Clean the rifle. These old guns fought wars with corrosive primers. Firing a few more won't cause them to roll over and die. You can also re-seat FMJ bullets to make a mild-kicking plinker.

My bullet puller was sold by Herter's (remember them?) but Forster still makes them. You'll need different collets for various caliber ranges. It works pretty darn well.

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In September we will be shooting on the 6th and 20th. We will stick with summer hours through September, so we'll start sign ups at 7:00, have the meeting at 7:45, and the new shooter class will be at 6:30. We'd like to know in advance if a new shooter is coming out. See ya out there!

Time to Pay Your Annual Membership Dues

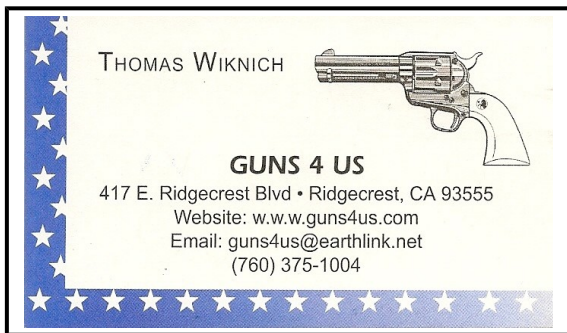
